Obviously, a group as small as our synagogue cannot change the world no matter how energetic and committed we might be. That said; a friend some years ago, was lamenting an encounter she had witnessed between a Jewish person and a non-Jewish person. The Jewish man was a bit unscrupulous in the transaction and it became obvious to the person he was dealing with. My friends lament was this; "this might be the only encounter this individual ever has with someone Jewish. What impression of our people does this leave?" That has stuck with me for more than twenty years now. I made a conscious decision that any dealings I might have with anyone would be straightforward and openly transparent. I think the easy translation of this is that I say what I mean and I mean what I say. My word is solid. I really feel that this is not only Torah based, but should be foundational to our society. I imagine that many people reading this will think that this is or should be normal behavior. May it be so in our community and may everyone we deal with see our Jewish community to have integrity.



Why Do We Dip Apples in Honey on Rosh Hashanah?

Apples and <u>honey</u> have become synonymous with <u>Rosh Hashanah</u> in many Jewish homes around the world – but where does this tradition come from, and what does it symbolize?

<u>Honey</u> is one of the central foods enjoyed by the Jewish people during <u>Rosh Hashanah</u>. Popularly incorporated into cakes, cookies, meat glazes, challah, and other <u>foods</u>, honey is also enjoyed on its own with apples throughout the High Holidays.

Honey has become an iconic symbol of Rosh Hashanah, just like <u>pomegranates</u> and <u>shofars</u>. But why do we eat honey and apples on Rosh Hashanah? What does honey symbolize? How did this tradition start?

We have all of the answers — and more! — so you can wow your friends and family with your sweet knowledge during Rosh Hashanah dinner. Read on to learn some unbee-lievable facts about honey and its connection to Rosh Hashanah and Judaism!

Israel as "the Land Flowing with Milk and Honey"

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In Exodus 3:8 in the <u>Hebrew Bible</u>, God promises <u>Moses</u> that the Israelites would be rewarded with a "good and spacious land, a land flowing with milk and honey." Of course, God was referencing the <u>Land of Israel</u>. The Midrash says that God called *Eretz Yisrael* this because milk provides nourishment and <u>honey</u> is known for its sweetness, so within the Promised Land, the Israelites would find both. It also alludes to the fertility of the land, and the better life of sustenance and sustainability awaiting the Israelites.

The phrase "the Land of Milk and Honey" has stuck throughout history as another name for the Land of Israel and in modern times, as a nickname for the <u>State of Israel</u>.

However, in his commentaries on the Torah, Rashi explained that this excerpt was actually talking about <u>date honey</u> (known in Hebrew as *silan*), which has historically been made by Jews in the region since Biblical times.

What does honey symbolize on Rosh Hashanah?

Many Jewish thinkers throughout history have come to the same simple conclusion: eating-honey-on-Rosh Hashanah symbolizes our hope for a sweet new year, and honey has been readily available in Jewish communities for thousands of years. It is important to remember that during the time of the Israelites, sugar canes did not exist in the desert or in the Land of Israel. Honey, whether from bees or dates, would've been our ancestors' go-to sweetener.

Is it required by Jewish law to eat honey during Rosh Hashanah?

Nope! Eating honey during Rosh Hashanah is a minhag, or a custom.

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The Cooking Corner Jewish Apple Cake

"A delicious cake filled and topped with apples and cinnamon." Ingredients

14 servings

- □ 3 cups all-purpose flour □ 1/2 teaspoon salt
- □ 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- □ 2 cups white sugar
- □ 4 eggs, beaten
- \(\square \) 1/4 cup orange juice
- □ 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- □ 3 apples peeled, cored and sliced thinly mixed with 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon □ 5 teaspoons white sugar
- Directions
- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease and flour one 10 inch bundt pan.
- 2. In a large mixing bowl, combine the flour, salt, baking powder and 2 cups of the sugar. Stir in the vegetable oil, beaten eggs, orange juice and vanilla. Mix well.
- 3. Place ½ of apple /sugar/cinnamon mixture on the bottom of the pan.
- 4. Pour 1/2 of the batter into the prepared pan. Top with 1/2 of the sliced apple /sugar/cinnamon mixture . Pour the remaining batter over the top .
- 5. Bake at 350 degrees F (175 degrees C) for 70 to 90 minutes.
